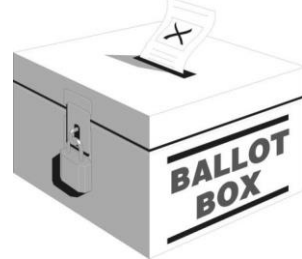
Bereavement: Mr Dorian Caudy

Congratulations to all our teams.

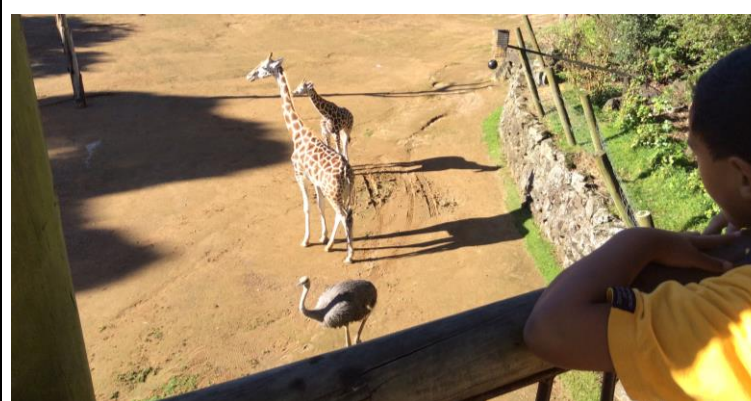
Education Outside The Classroom: Zoo trip

What amazing adaptations animals have made to adapt to their natural world. Our tamariki had a wonderful learning experience on their zoo trip and we owe a big thank you to Ms Afeaki and her team

of teachers and helpers who made the whole thing run so smoothly.

Amazing animal facts:-Zoo trip

It astonishes me how well animals adapt to their different environments. Did you know that an **ostrich** is a flightless bird and can run up to 70km per hour and in a single stride can cover up to 5metres! The ostrich lays giant eggs, the largest of any kind of living bird. And if threatened ostriches do not put their head in the sand but will try and hide or use their powerful legs to kick at their attacker.



The **giraffe** is the tallest mammal in the world and with their long necks and blue tongues (tongues can grow up to 45 cm long – that's nearly half a metre.) they can reach the tallest trees to get the tastiest leaves at the top of the tree canopy.
