If you have moved house or changed phone numbers, please let Ms Wilson our school secretary know. (This information will be kept strictly confidential)


Sistema Year 2

Health and Nutrition



As you are aware from the news, there is a big concern about the amount of sugar and salt in our diets and how this can lead to obesity and health issues like diabetes later in life. Did you know that your child gets free Anchor milk and a piece of fruit every day and lunch too if they need it?

Message from the Council: Dog problems

In the news recently there has been a growing alarm around the number of dog attacks which have inflicted severe wounds on young children. These injuries can be horrific. The latest attack reported in the Herald on Sunday was about a 7 year old boy who had facial injuries requiring over 150 stitches to repair. These attacks have got to stop so Auckland Council has decided to do something about it with a programme of support with little and no low cost to dog owners who look after their dog and penalties for those who don't.



Auckland Council has launched an amnesty initiative and strict new rules aimed at reducing the harm done by menacing dogs in the community.

Free registration for 'menacing' dogs Dogs classified as a menacing type, particularly American Pit Bull Terriers, will have their 2016/17 registration fee and any failed dog registration fines waived if the dog is registered before 1 July 2016.

\$25 for de-sexing, micro-chipping

Additionally, the council will provide de-sexing, micro-chipping and muzzles for these dogs at a nominal \$25 fee. After one year, the council will provide a Responsible Dog Owner Licence to candidates who qualify.

Strict rules from 1 July 2016

From 1 July, any unregistered menacing dogs will automatically be seized and the owners fined. Auckland Council's Animal Management team will conduct a widespread enforcement campaign. Over the coming weeks, Aucklanders will see advertising and information distributed in a number of different languages. A direct

contact number (0800 462 685) will also be established for people to find out more about how they can take up the offer. People can also phone this number for emergency response in the wake of an attack.

Complaints

With the best will in the world things can sometimes go wrong. It is a fact of life & when things go wrong how we sort it out is important. At home you know if one of your little ones hits their brother or sister you talk to them about their actions, that you love them but not what they did & that there will be consequences if this behaviour continues - time out, no tv, sent to bed early, no play station etc. Even if you don't fully recognize it, every family will have a way of handling problems & getting things back on track. The same applies to school & we give it an official title - a Complaints Policy. Basically if something is of a concern to you, the best thing you need to do is come in and talk about it. No matter what the issue is you need to talk it over with your child's teacher, or our management team or me. This initial conversation may mean that there is further investigating and reporting back to you later but talking it over is the fairest way to deal with things.



1. If you have a concern about your child and its minor see your child's teacher.
2. If it's a major/serious concern come and see me.

You may need to make an appointment to see me but my door is always open to you. Come and see me.
