Ministry of Primary Industries: Fruit Fly

As you will have seen in the news and from the guarantine signs, the Otara area is still under threat from the Fruit Fly outbreak. This means that while fruit can come in (eg. Shops markets etc) no fruit is allowed to leave the area. So at

school we have special bins for fruit scraps which are emptied daily. It is important that we follow these rules as the fruit fly can cause dollars millions of damage to crops and fruit if it gets established here. So if you send

your child with a piece of fruit as part of their lunch please talk with your child about putting any scraps into the special bins. Your help with this is appreciated.

This fruit is now inedible as the fruit fly has laid its eggs inside and the larvae will destroy the fruit.



Health and Safety: Measles, mumps & Rubella. (MMR)

Unfortunately there is a possibility of a measles outbreak spreading across New Zealand. It's an easy disease to control and prevent if you have been vaccinated but if you child hasn't had the injections when they are little then you are at risk. Measles leaves you miserable, with a rash, high fever, cough, runny nose, red eyes loss of appetite. So if you haven't had your child immunized or you are not sure if your child has had all their injections please speak to your family doctor and check. Today with the
